Always Review Pro-

posals

Any funder can recite a list of egregious mistakes they've encountered in grant requests, from proposals that name the wrong funder, to a proposal with dollar amounts inconsistent with the project budget. Often these are last minute mistakes that undermine a lot of hard work. Whether it's the Principal or district Grant Writer editing the proposer's work or writing, or simply two colleagues supporting one another, time for this important step needs to be built in when planning a grant project.
